





NOTICE TO STUDENTS

Effective July 1, 2019, all students participating in live fire training are required to be eighteen years of age and have met the minimum requirements for NFPA 1403. The chief or training officer of the department will be required to sign off on students who have met the minimum requirements before they can participate. A copy of the required form is located on the back of the registration form.

All students attending classes for certification through the NC Office of State Fire Marshal are required to have proper identification with them, as verification is required before being administered a certification test.

SPECIALTY NON-CERTIFICATION

1. Not Your Everyday Pin Job (18 hours)

Friday 630pm-830pm, Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-5pm

This class will consist of real-world tactics which are used to free patients from major pin jobs. Hands on training dealing with side resting vehicles, vehicles with major intrusions, vehicle overrides and dash displacement, to include techniques for dash evolutions on pin jobs. **(PPE Required)**

2. Fireground Survival (16 hours)

Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-5pm

This class is totally hands on and will encompass training on forcible entry, wall breeches, below grade firefighter retrieval, Denver drill, victim removal and downed firefighter CPR. **(PPE Required)**

Instructors: Box 1971 LLC

3. De-Escalation/Driving Simulator Training (4 hours)

Saturday 8am-12pm and 1pm-5pm (Two separate sessions, register only for one and specify AM/PM)

Being a first responder puts you in situations that could become potentially dangerous. This training is designed to give first responders hands on reality-based training. Also included is driver simulation training using RCC's new state of the art firearms and driving simulator, which includes police vehicles, fire trucks and ambulance scenarios.

Students must provide appropriate personal protective equipment for all classes.

4. FF General and Communications (24 hours)

Friday 1pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8am-4pm

This block of instruction covers orientation and fire service communications.

5. FF Fireground Ops 1 (24 hours)

Friday 1pm-10pm., Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8am-4pm

This block of instruction covers firefighter health and safety.

6. FF Fireground Ops 2 (24 hours)

Friday 1pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8a-4pm

This block of instruction covers firefighter personal protective equipment.

7. FF Fireground Ops 3 (32 hours)

Thursday 1pm-10pm, Friday 8am-6pm, Saturday 8am-6p, & Sunday 8am-3pm

This block of instruction covers building construction, portable extinguishers and fire behavior.

8. FF Fireground Ops 4 (32 hours)

TECHNICAL RESCUER CERTIFICATION

Students must provide appropriate personal protective equipment for all classes.

18. TR RESCUE OPERATIONS (14 hours)

Friday 7pm-10pm., Saturday 8am-4pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

This course will present the Technical Rescuer (TR) with the requirements for pre-planning, scene size-up, and hazards assessment for incidents involving rope rescue. This course will also introduce the Technical Rescuer to applicable standards addressing rope rescue, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), accessory gear, rope software, and rope hardware. NFPA 1006 Chapters 5 and 6.

19. TR ROPE BASICS (14 hours)

Friday 7pm-10pm., Saturday 8am-4pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

This course will present to the Technical Rescuer (TR) safe and effective methods of rescue in elevated and below grade environments using ropes, knots, and rope related equipment. Mechanical advantage, anchors, anchoring techniques, and stress loads will be covered. NFPA 1006 Chapters 5 and 6.

20. TR VICTIM MANAGEMENT (16 Hours)

Friday 630pm-1030pm, Saturday 830am-530pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

The course will present to the Technical Rescuer (TR) the safe and effective methods of rescuing a victim using multiple scenarios. NFPA 1006 Chapters 5 and 6.

21. TR MAG MACHINERY AND AG BLOCK (40 hours)

Wednesday 1pm-10pm, Thursday 8am-6pm, Friday 8a-6pm, Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8am-1pm

REPORT DIRECTLY TO THE EMERGENCY SERVICES TRAINING CENTER

***** Class is limited to 30 students*****

This block course will present the Technical Rescuer with the knowledge, skills, and abilities to satisfy the requirements of Chapter 19 (Machinery) of NFPA 1006: Standard for Technical Rescue Professional Qualifications. In addition, this course covers agricultural-related emergencies and how to mitigate those responses.

22. PUMPS INTRODUCTION AND BASIC OPERATIONS (36 Hours)

23. EMERGENCY VEHICLE DRIVER (24 hours)

HAZMAT CERTIFICATION

27. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS OPERATIONS (40 Hours)

Wednesday 1pm-10pm, Thursday 8am-6pm, Friday 8a-6pm, Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8am-1pm

This course meets OSFM's training requirements for the Hazardous Materials Operations credential. Course content includes lecture and practice activities needed to perform the following tasks safely and effectively: (1) implement standard operating procedures in the current edition of the DOT Emergency Response Guidebook; (2) analyze hazardous materials/WMD incident; (3) plan an initial response to a hazardous materials/WMD incident; (4) implement the planned response for a hazardous materials/WMD incident; (5) evaluate the progress of the actions taken at a hazardous materials/WMD incident.

28. NIMS 300 (20 hours)

Wednesday 1pm-10pm, Thursday 830am-530pm & Friday 830am-1230pm

This course is for persons at mid-level management serving as command staff, section chiefs, strike team leaders, task force leaders, unit leaders, division/group supervisors, branch directors, and multi-agency coordination system/emergency operations center staff.

29. NIMS 400 (12 hours)

Saturday 830am-530pm & Sunday 830am-1230pm

This advanced Incident Command System (ICS) course is designed to explain how major incidents engender special management challenges, describe the circumstances in which an Area Command is established, and describe the circumstances in which multi-agency coordination systems are established.

SPECIALTY CERTIFICATION

30. CHIEF 101 (8 hours)

Saturday 830am – 530pm

This class will satisfy the 9S inspection criteria as specified by the North Carolina Administrative Code. The primary objective of the course is to inform current and future chief officers of the various aspects and complexities surrounding the operations and organization of North Carolina fire departments. Emphasis will be placed on ratings and inspections, NFIRS reporting, prevention and grant programs, basic line-of-duty death information, financial considerations, and an overview of the various expectations facing a chief officer.

31. CHIEF 101 REFRESHER (4 hours)

Friday 600pm-10pm

Refresher course for those who have already taken the full 8-hour course.

32. FIRE OFFICER I (40 hours)

Wednesday 1pm-10pm, Thursday 8am-6pm, Friday 8a-6pm, Saturday 8am–6pm & Sunday 8am–1pm

This course identifies the performance requirements necessary to perform the duties of a first line supervisor. This course introduces the student to the basic concept of management and supervision. Upon completion, the individual will be able to supervise, instruct, and direct members of the fire department in both emergency and non-emergency situations.

Needs: Jones & Bartlett "Fire Officer Principals & Practices" 3rd edition.

33. FIRE OFFICER II (32 hours)

Thursday 1pm-10pm, Friday 8a-6pm, Saturday 8am–6pm & Sunday 8am–3pm

This course will present the knowledge, skills and ability to satisfy the requirements of the Chapter V of the NFPA 1021: Standard for Fire Officer Professional Qualifications. This course is designed to meet the needs of the mid-level officer/supervisor.

Needs: Jones & Bartlett "Fire Officer Principals & Practices" 3rd edition.

CODE ENFORCEMENT CERTIFICATION

34. LAW & ADMINISTRATION (15 hours)

Friday 7pm-10pm., Saturday 830am-5pm & Sunday 8am-1pm

This course is designed to provide a basic understanding of the governmental and legal system with which every code enforcement official works. The course satisfies the training requirements to gain admission to the state qualifying exam. Students are to furnish their own textbook "Administration Code and Policies" of the North Carolina State Building Code, latest edition.

EMS

35. AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION CPR INSTRUCTOR COURSE (16 Hours)

Saturday 8a-5p and Sunday 8am-5pm

The BLS Essentials Course is designed to prepare instructor candidates on how to teach AHA courses. Students are required to have a current AHA CPR Provider card. No other cards will be accepted. Students will also be required to have a copy of the current AHA Instructor Manual. A manual may be purchased at <http://shopcpr.heart.org/courses/bls>. Students must successfully pass a 25-question examination, making 84% or higher. Additional requirements will be discussed in class. Any questions, contact Brad Lawson at blawson@robesson.edu.

36. INITIAL FIRE INVESTIGATIONS FOR FIRST RESPONDERS (16 hours)

Friday 6pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

This course provides a clear definition of the role of initial responder to recognize the potential of an intentionally set fire, preserve evidence, and properly report the information to appropriate officials. Basic topics include: fire behavior, critical observations of the first responder, fire cause, scene security and evidence preservation, legal considerations, and the reporting of findings.

37. LEADERSHIP IN SUPERVISION: CREATING ENVIRONMENTS FOR PROFESSIONAL GROWTH (16 hours)

Friday 6pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

This course presents the supervisor with the basic leadership skills and tools needed to perform effectively in the fire service environment and includes concepts related to a successful transition to supervisory and leadership roles, including concepts of adaptive leadership; change management; active followership; effective communication, including difficult conversations and advocacy-inquiry-based dialogue; ethics; authority; power; decision making; and active engagement through development of a personal plan.

38. LEADERSHIP IN SUPERVISION: PERSPECTIVES IN THINKING (16 hours)

Friday 6pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

This course provides the supervisor with the conceptual foundation and framework for success in leadership roles by exploring creative, analytical, political and critical thinking perspectives and addresses skills needed for assessing situations from multiple perspectives, making critical decisions, fostering creativity and innovation, and using persuasion.





NON-CERTIFICATION

39. EXPLOSIVES, BOMBS & BOOBY TRAPS (15 hours)

Friday 7pm-10pm., Saturday 830am – 500pm & Sunday 800am-1pm

This class takes Emergency First Responders (EMS, Fire, Law Enforcement, and Rescue) through basic understandings of explosives, explosive environments and understanding how they function. The latest Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) being employed overseas and domestically, how they are constructed, the damage they can cause, and how they are being used by terrorists against first responders. Also, what first responders can do to ensure their safety against this new threat. The course will take the students through bomb threats, searches, and booby traps, all of which they may encounter in their jobs. It will also discuss ways to discover terrorist methods, activities and the latest cases and ways they can help stop future events in the U. S. This course will be presented through classroom instruction and practical exercises including bomb searches, booby trapped trails, and live explosive demonstrations.

40. FATAL FIRE INVESTIGATIONS (12 hours)

Saturday 830am – 500pm & Sunday 800am – 1pm

This course aids in all parts of fire and law enforcement investigations into any type of fatal fire and will go over many avenues of responsibility of each party and will help everyone with the scene and follow up.

41. ADVANCED FIREFIGHTING TECHNIQUES (20 Hours)

Friday 1pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-5pm & Sunday 8am-12pm

Minimum age requirement is 18 years old. Full PPE with SCBA is required.

This course is designed for the experienced firefighter to practice suppression techniques in a variety of live fire scenarios. Instructors will incorporate the use of LP gas props, rail car, burn trailer and class A burn building. **NC OSEF Live Fire Course Competency Validation Form 200.14a (on the back of the registration form) MUST be completed in order to enroll!**

42. NFPA 1403 ACADEMY (22 Hours)

Friday 1pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-6pm & Sunday 8am-1pm

This course is designed for the firefighter with little or no experience. Basics to be covered include fire streams, SCBA, hose practices, building construction, ladders and fire behavior. Practical applications will be used. This class meets the minimum qualifications for NFPA 1403.

Needs: Full PPE

43. LAND NAVIGATION (20 hours)

Friday 6-10 p.m., Saturday 8 a.m. – 7 p.m., & Sunday 8 a.m. – 2 p.m.

This class will consist of the use of GPS and compass over terrain and how to determine your location while on a mission. There will be practical exercises for the student to become familiar with both of these tools for search activities.

Needs: Compass

44. NC RATING RESPONSE SYSTEM (12 hours)

Saturday 830am – 500pm & Sunday 800am-1pm

A representative from the NC Department of Insurance will discuss the new rating response system program and how it relates to the ISO system. Learn how your department will be rated in the future.

Needs: Calculator, paper, No. 2 pencils, map of your service area with all hydrants, and apparatus inventories on all trucks in your department.

45. RESCUE DIVER (22 Hours)

Friday 6pm-10pm, Saturday 8am-9pm & Sunday 8am-3pm

The rescue diver certification is designed to develop the knowledge and necessary skills for an individual to effectively perform diver rescues and assists, and administer necessary first aid.

Note: Class will meet on main campus Friday evening and be at off site locations Saturday and Sunday.
