#### JADA L. BROOKS, PhD, MSPH, RN, FAAN, PhD Program Lead Faculty UNC School of Nursing Associate Professor and Ross Distinguished Term Scholar of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nursing

Jada L. Brooks, an enrolled member of the Lumbee Tribe, is an Associate Professor and Ross Distinguished Term Scholar of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Nursing. One of few Indigenous nurses holding a doctoral degree, Dr. Brooks is widely regarded as a scholar and leader in health disparities research with tribal communities in North Carolina and beyond. Funded externally for two decades by the National Institutes of Health, her 20+ years of communityengaged research focuses on environmental conditions that shape health outcomes and inequalities among American Indians. As an Indigenous nurse scientist, Dr. Brooks is dedicated to raising awareness about environmental health in Indian Country and is equally devoted to cultivating the next generation of environmental leaders.

In this session, the presenter shares information that precollege and college students can use to help give them a better foundation for starting their career drawing from recent experiences of undergrad and being an early professional. College truly is an extension of your career giving you a base for the ability to learn, building a network, and some experience that will be leveraged into getting that first job after graduation. Topics to explore will include using resources such as tutoring centers, Student Support Services (Trio), and their Career Development Centers (CDC's). Exploring different experiences such as studying abroad, to do a rotational COOP or not to COOP (the downsides to not having any experience when graduating), and joining student clubs. Personal activities that could be beneficial such as developing a routine, saving money/learning how to manage finances, and taking time to learn more about yourself.

Common dilemmas: Do I need a masters? Why it's a good idea to start planning for furthering your education instead of waiting.

Why do I need a mentor? Understanding what type of mentorship is needed for what situation.

Should I stick to this degree? Why it's okay to not know what you want to do (a lot of people don't know what they want to do).

#### THE FUTURE OF CYBERSECURITY | RM 1458A, DOWNSTAIRS

Zach Oxendine, Engineering Technical Program Manager - Microsoft

Cybersecurity professionals are concerned about the growing number and sophistication of cyber threats and attacks, which can result in significant financial and reputational damage. They are also worried about the shortage of skilled cybersecurity professionals and the skills gap, as demand for cybersecurity expertise continues to grow faster than the supply of qualified candidates. In addition, emerging technologies like AI, machine learning, and IoT pose new challenges and risks, creating new attack surfaces that are difficult to secure. Finally, compliance with a growing number of regulations and standards related to data privacy and security is a major concern for cybersecurity professionals, as non-compliance can result in significant consequences for organizations.

#### EMPOWERING NATIVE AMERICAN YOUTH THROUGH STEM: LESSONS FROM THE WACCAMAW SIOUAN STEM STUDIO | RM 1413A, DOWNSTAIRS

Coty Sutherland, Software Engineering Manager - Red Hat, Inc.

As you probably know, the underrepresentation of Native Americans in STEM fields is a persistent problem, but one that can be addressed through early and consistent engagement in STEM education. The Waccamaw Siouan STEM Studio, an award-winning STEM program for tribal youth, has developed a successful model for promoting STEM education and careers among Native American youth.

Led by Indigenous community members and grounded in Indigenous values, the STEM Studio provides a culturally inclusive environment for youth to learn about STEM topics and interact with STEM professionals who look like them. The program has expanded to include annual programs like the Yaccune Camp and STEM Day, as well as new experiences such as computer programming, archaeology, and 3D printing.

In this presentation, we will share the story of how the STEM Studio was founded and the values that drive the program. We will also provide practical guidance for audience members who may be interested in starting their own STEM programs in their tribes or communities. Topics covered will include securing funding and fiscal sponsorship, identifying STEM professionals within the community, and developing culturally responsive programming.

We believe that empowering Native American youth through STEM education is a critical step in addressing the lack of representation in STEM fields. By sharing our experiences and lessons learned, we hope to inspire and support others in creating similar programs in their own communities. Join us to learn more about the Waccamaw Siouan STEM Studio and how you can make a difference in the lives of Native American youth.

We will then determine real life examples of how different aspects of our health affect each other. Finally, we will construct action plans to address needs in our individual health and utilize tools to compact unhealthy practices.



Zach Oxendine was born and raised in Rock Hill, South Carolina but currently resides and works in Reston, Virginia. He is a member of the Lumbee tribe and a Child of Deaf Adults (CODA). He enlisted in the Air Force in 2014 winning airman of the year in 2017 and after serving for four and half years in Cyber Systems Operations, he entered the Air Force reserves where he continues to serve as a Cyber Staff Sergeant. During his enlistment he earned his associates in Information Technology from the Community College of the Air Force. Zach is now an Engineering Technical Program Manager at Microsoft working on Air Gap Cloud Solutions. In addition to engineering, he serves as the external lead for Microsoft's United States Indigenous Employee Resource Group. Zach is also on the Cyber Defense Advisory Board at University of North Carolina at Pembroke. Zach leads the development of STEM camps for High School students. Zach has delivered keynotes at the White House, conferences and colleges. Zach also consults on cybersecurity education, and workforce development with tribal communities, rural communities, and college programs alike.


